HOUSE VOTING RECORD 115th Congress, 1st Session (2017)

Deregulation/CFPB

Roll Call No. 299. Passage of HR 10, Financial Choice Act. Eliminates some of the most important aspects of Dodd-Frank, guts the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, depriving it of independent financing, helping large banks at the expense of consumers, investors and small business, allowing shoddy financial actors to use unfair, abusive and deceptive acts, excessive risk-taking, jeopardizing the economy in ways that caused the 2008 financial crisis, unemployment and foreclosures. Passed 233-186, June 8, 2017. a nay vote is a +.

Foreign Policy

Roll Cal No. 680. Passage of HR 1638. Iranian Leadership Asset Transparency Act. Requires the Treasury Secretary to report on assets under direct or indirect control of certain Iranians, regardless of whether they are subject to sanctions, diverting Treasury resources from monitoring those subject to sanctions. Since the report would be classified, the bill serves no useful purpose to help Iranians combat corruption. The real purpose is to stop legitimate business with Iran, undermining the nuclear deal. Passed 289-135, Dec. 13, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Labor

Roll Call No. 244. Passage of HR 1180, the Working Families Flexibility Act of 2017. Falsely claiming to be “pro-family,” the bill amends the FLSA to allow employers to provide comp time in lieu of overtime, at employer discretion, not when workers need the comp time. Passed 229-197, a nay vote is a +.

Defense

Roll Call No. 358, Passage of Pramila (D-WA) amendment to HR 2810, National Defense Authorization Act. The amendment would register the sense of Congress to require increase of non-defense spending for any increase in the combined budgets of the National Defense and Overseas Contingency Operations. Failed 179-245, July 13, 2017. A yea vote is a +.

Deregulation/Environment/Health

Roll Call No. 391. Passage of HR 806, Ozone Standards Implementation Act of 2017. Strikes at the heart of the Clean Air Act causing irreparable harm to public health and the environment by delaying up to 8 years EPA rules to improve National Ambient Air Quality Standards based on science, changing the standard by assessing technology for implementation. Passed 229-199, July 18, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Roll Call No. 398. Passage of HR 2883, Promoting Cross-Border Energy Infrastructure. Weakens the process for approving oil and natural gas pipelines and electric transmission lines that cross borders with Canada and Mexico, exempting them from environmental and safety reviews and limiting input of affected communities. Passed 254-175, July 19, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Ethics

Roll Call No. 46. Green (D-TX) amendment to HR 78, the SEC Regulatory Accountability Act. The amendment would require the SEC to identify, analyze and address possible conflicts of interest related to its rule making. Failed 192-233, Jan. 12, 2017, a yea vote is a +.

Abortion/Family Planning

Roll Call No. 549. Passage of HR 36, Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act. Would criminalize performing abortions after 20 weeks except to save the mother's life, rape or incest. Passed 237-189, Oct. 3, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Guns

Roll Call No. 663. Passage of HR 38, Concealed-Carry Reciprocity Act of 2017. The bill eviscerates state efforts to increase gun safety, forcing them recognize other states' laws permitting concealed-carry of guns in public. Passed 231-198, Dec. 6, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Civil Rights, Consumer Protection, Accountability

Roll Call No. 148. Passage of HR 985. Fairness in Class Action Litigation and Further Asbestos Claim Transparency Act of 2017. The bill limits class action suits, tilting the civil justice system to favor corporations, denying consumer access to justice. Passed 220-201, March 9, 2017. a nay vote is a +.

Criminal Justice/Civil Liberties

Roll Call No. 265. Passage of HR 115, Thin Blue Line Act. Without public hearings the bill would expand the specific list of aggravating factors in federal death penalty cases that target law enforcement officers and first responders, duplicating existing state and federal laws, but making almost all murders eligible for the death penalty, without addressing racial disparities, lack of qualified counsel resources and faulty forensic science that were addressed in defeated amendments, thus constitutionally problematic. Passed 271-143, May 18, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Roll Call No. 543. Passage of HR 2792, Control of Unlawful Fugitive Felons Act of 2017. A bill adopted without hearings deprives some old and disabled people of SSI and magnifies racial, ethnic and socioeconomic inequities in the criminal justice system without due process

by making people accused – not convicted – of misdemeanors and felonies ineligible for SSI benefits. Current law sufficiently prevents SSI benefits to fugitive felons. Passed 244-171, Sept. 28, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Health

Roll Call No. 604. Passage of HR 849, Protecting Seniors Access to Medicare Act. Repeals the Independent Payment Advisory Board designed to rein in Medicare costs without harming seniors. The IPAB would be needed if the ACA cost-savings were repealed. The bill raises concerns that repeal of the IPAB would lead to cuts in Medicare. Passed 307-111, Nov.2, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Roll Call No. 256. Passage of HR 1628, American Health Care Act would cause 24 million Americans to lose health insurance coverage, also undermines health care from Medicare and employer-sponsored health insurance in order to give tax cuts to the wealthy and corporations. Passed 217-213, May 4, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

Immigration

Roll Call No. 342. Passage of HR 3003, No Sanctuary for Criminals Act. Prohibits any federal, state, or local government or individual from preventing any government employee from complying with immigration laws or cooperating with federal law enforcement or preventing access to immigration status. Penalizes states by limiting some Justice Acts grants. Passed 228-195, June 29, 2017. A nay vote is a +.

District of Columbia

Roll Call No. 520. Norton (D-DC) amendment to HR 3354, Appropriation for Department of Interior, EPA and other agencies for FY 2018. Norton's amendment would delete the bill's provision repealing The District of Columbia Budgetary Autonomy Amendments of 2012. Failed 186-226, Sept. 13, 2017. A yea vote is a +.

Education/Welfare

Roll Call No. 537. Passage of HR 2824, Increased Opportunity for Success of Children and Parents Through Evidence-based Home Visiting. Passed 214-209, Sept. 26, 2017. Despite its nice name, the bill provides no new funding for good maternal, infant, childhood programs but takes funds from SSI for elderly and disabled persons. A nay vote is a +.

Progressive Budget

Roll Call No. 553. Grijalva (D-AZ) Substitute Amendment no. 1, to H. Con Res. 71, 2018 Budget and Budget Levels for FY 2019-2017. The amendment would substitute the Progressive Budget, to implement progressive values. Failed 108-314, Oct. 4, 2017. A yea vote is a +.

Taxes

Roll Call No. 637. Passage of HR 1, Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. Disproportionately benefits the wealthy and big corporations. Almost half of middle-class families would see tax increases in 2026, one-third would pay more in 2018.
